BACKGROUND

The District Board of Directors is required to annually review and take the appropriate actions to set the rates for the District's Special Benefit Assessment program. The Special Benefit Assessment, which started in Fiscal Year 2005/2006, continues to be the most prominent and secure revenue source for the District. The assessment may be levied by the District Board for an indefinite term as long as the services are being provided. The Special Benefit Assessment provides the majority of the revenue needed by the District to provide required and expected services to the communities we serve.

The proposed rates calculated by Willdan Financial Services are based on flat rate increases of 1%, 1.5%, 2% and 3% (Exhibit A).

Each year, the maximum assessment rates can be increased by an annual inflation adjustment with approval from the Board of Directors. The inflation adjustment allows the maximum assessment rates to be increased annually by the greater of the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, San Francisco-Oakland-Hayward, CA (CPI), or 3%. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the San Francisco Bay CPI from February 2022 to February 2023 is 5.3%. (Exhibit "B")

Staff has also included the Assessment Project Timeline for the Fiscal Year 2023-2024. The project timeline depicts the various steps that are required by all agencies involved for the processing and submission of the District's FY 2023-2024 Special Benefit Assessment rate on the county property tax roll. (Exhibit "C")

FISCAL IMPACT

A 3% increase in the special assessment rate would generate an estimated additional \$253,792.88 in Special Benefit Assessment revenue for the District.

RECOMMENDATION

The Board consider taking formal action to adopt Resolution 2023-006 reflecting a _3_% increase for FY 2023-2024. Staff recommends of the Board adopt Resolution 2023-006 to ensure the District stays within the project timeline with all involved parties to complete the required work moving forward with the Special Benefit Assessment steps to meet Stanislaus County's final deadline to be placed on the county tax bill. Please see attached Resolution No. 2023-006, Ordering the Levy and Collection Assessments within the SCFPD Special Benefit Assessment Rate for FY 2023-2024.

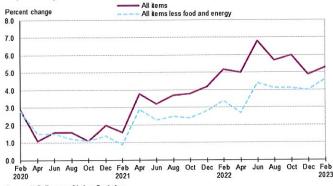
Consumer Price Index, San Francisco Area — February 2023

Area prices were up 1.8 percent over the past two months, up 5.3 percent from a year ago

Prices in the San Francisco area, as measured by the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U), advanced 1.8 percent for the two months ending in February 2023, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. (See table A.) Regional Commissioner Chris Rosenlund noted that the February increase was influenced by higher prices for shelter. (Data in this report are not seasonally adjusted. Accordingly, month-to-month changes may reflect seasonal influences.)

Over the last 12 months, the CPI-U advanced 5.3 percent. (See <u>chart 1</u> and <u>table A</u>.) Food prices increased 8.0 percent, and energy prices rose 8.6 percent. The index for all items less food and energy increased 4.6 percent over the year. (See <u>table 1</u>.)

Food

Food prices increased 1.2 percent for the two months ending in February. (See table 1.) Prices for food at home increased 1.2 percent, with higher prices in three of the six subcategories. Prices for food away from home increased 1.2 percent for the same period.

Over the year, food prices increased 8.0 percent. Prices for food at home rose 8.1 percent since a year ago. Price increases across food at home expenditure categories ranged from 5.3 percent for meats, poultry, fish, and eggs to 10.8 percent for nonalcoholic beverages and beverage materials. Prices for food away from home advanced 7.8 percent.

Energy

The energy index advanced 6.6 percent for the two months ending in February. The increase was mainly due to higher prices for natural gas service (18.0 percent). Prices for gasoline rose 4.6 percent, and prices for electricity increased 3.4 percent for the same period.

Energy prices rose 8.6 percent over the year, led by higher prices for natural gas service (29.1 percent). Prices paid for electricity increased 13.6 percent, but prices for gasoline declined 1.2 percent during the past year.

All items less food and energy

The index for all items less food and energy advanced 1.6 percent in the latest two-month period. Higher prices for apparel (6.3 percent), household furnishings and operations (3.8 percent), and shelter (1.8 percent) were partially offset by lower prices for used cars and trucks (-2.6 percent).

Over the year, the index for all items less food and energy increased 4.6 percent. Components contributing to the increase included household furnishings and operations (7.5 percent), and shelter (4.4 percent). Partly offsetting the increases was a price decrease in used cars and trucks (-11.9 percent).

Technical Note

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measures of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. The Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes CPIs for two population groups: (1) a CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 93 percent of the total U.S. population and (2) a CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which covers approximately 29 percent of the total U.S. population. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Each month, prices are collected in 75 urban areas across the country from about 6,000 housing units and approximately 22,000 retail establishments—department stores, supermarkets, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index.

The index measures price changes from a designated reference date; for most of the CPI-U the reference base is 1982-84 equals 100. An increase of 7 percent from the reference base, for example, is shown as 107,000. Alternatively, that relationship can also be expressed as the price of a base period market basket of goods and services rising from \$100 to \$107. For further details see the CPI home page on the internet at www.bls.gov/cpi and the CPI section of the BLS Handbook of Methods available on the internet at www.bls.gov/opub/hom/cpi/.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights that represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Because the sample size of a local area is smaller, the local area index is subject to substantially more sampling and other measurement error than the national index. In addition, local indexes are not adjusted for seasonal influences. As a result, local area indexes show greater volatility than the national index, although their long-term trends are quite similar. **NOTE: Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices between cities; they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.**

The San Francisco-Oakland-Hayward, CA. metropolitan area covered in this release is comprised of Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, San Francisco, San Mateo Counties in the State of California.

FIRE ASSESSMENT RATE REDUCTION "LIFELINE" PROGRAM

Description

Stanislaus Consolidated Fire Protection District offers a rate reduction allowance for fees collected from the District's Special Benefit Assessment for property owners who meet the eligibility requirements based on the limited income guidelines below. **Eligibility**

- You must be the residential property owner(s) listed on the tax bill and you must reside within SCFPD Fire District.
- Your *TOTAL Household's Income (before taxes) for all eligible people in the household must be at or below:

*Number of people in the household as defined by the IRS including you, a spouse, and/or eligible dependents. An eligible dependent is defined eligible as someone who: 1) lives with and is related to you, 2) is a US citizen, US resident or resident of Canada or Mexico, 3) does not file a joint return, 4) must provide social security number for all household members, 5)does not have \$4,050 or more of gross (total) income (does not apply to your child if under age 19 or student under age 24), and 6) is financially supported (more than 50%) by you, 7) a dependent whom you claim on your IRS income tax. Income **must** be verified by your Federal Income Tax return and/or other proof of income. Rates may be adjusted annually.

Reduction Rate

If approved, the rate reduction will be 50% of the current Special Benefit Assessment Charge for Residential Rate only.

Application Process

You <u>must</u> apply for the Rate Reduction "Lifeline" Program <u>and</u> submit application with the following required documents listed below:

- 1. Completed and Signed Application Form
- 2. Copy of your current Stanislaus County Tax Bill
- 3. Copy of your 2020 Federal Income Tax Return Statement
- 4. Proof of Total Household Income-(copies of 3 months proof of Total Household Income, deposits showing income)
- 5. Completed and Signed IRS 4506-T Form for every adult (18 yrs. or older) in the household
- 6. Completed and Signed SSA-3288 Form
- 7. Application and all required documents required must submitted to SCFPD at address listed above by July 2, 2023.

You must submit proof of total household income. The names on the tax bill and on the application must be the same. The property owner must reside in the home within the District. The District must receive application and required documents by the deadline date indicated on the application. Postmarks will not be accepted. Applications received after the deadline date will be processed as <u>late</u>. There is a \$40 fee charged to the District by the County for making late modifications. This fee will be deducted from any potential refund; *and/or* qualifying property owners who apply after the deadline. You must pay the full assessment for which you are billed. If approved, the District will reimburse the 50% reduction rate when requested by the property owner in writing and upon the District receiving proof, tax bills and payment in full, less the \$40 charge. If your application is approved, you will be mailed an application packet next year. Documents provided to SCFPD are considered property of the District.

A RESOLUTION ORDERING THE LEVY AND COLLECTION OF CHARGES WITHIN THE STANISLAUS CONSOLIDATED FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT SPECIAL BENEFIT ASSESSMENT RATE WITH 3% INCREASE

The Stanislaus Consolidated Fire Protection District does resolve as follows:

WHEREAS, the Stanislaus Consolidated Fire Protection District has by previous resolutions or other proceedings declared its intent to levy charges or assessments for the purpose of fire protection under the provisions of the State of California Government Code section 50078 et seq.

WHEREAS, the charges against the real property are not levied with regard to property values but rather services that are immediately available to the property owner.

WHEREAS, the Stanislaus Consolidated Fire Protection District has previously adopted the assessment methodology for the purpose of fire protection set forth in Exhibit A hereto, including authorization to annually increase the assessment by the greater of 3% or the increase in the consumer price index, in conformity with Government Code section 50078.6, article XIII D, section 3 of the California Constitution, and Government Code section 53753. Levies henceforth will be solely by way of the methodology as described in "Exhibit A", with 3%.

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Stanislaus Consolidated Fire Protection District has previously approved and adopted a Fire Assessment Limited Income Rate Reduction ("Lifeline") Program with respect to the imposition of the assessment levy as provided herein "Exhibit D".

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Stanislaus Consolidated Fire Protection District so orders the levy and collection of such charges within the Stanislaus Consolidated Fire Protection District for the 2023-2024 fiscal year in the amounts set forth in Exhibit "A" hereto, and that a certified copy of this resolution and attached documentation (Exhibit "A") shall be delivered to the Auditor-Controller of the County of Stanislaus for placement of such charges on the 2023/2024 County Tax Roll.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the previously adopted Fire Assessment Limited Income Rate Reduction (Lifeline) Program and Income Guidelines shall be applicable, where appropriated, to the levy of the assessment as provided herein.
